WHEN YOU STARTED YOUR JOB OR GOT INTO THE CONSTRUCTION INDUSTRY WHAT DO YOU WISH YOU WOULD HAVE KNOWN?

The key to long term influence is relationship. Relationship should always come before opportunity. I am wired to complete tasks. I would often put off or neglect building relationship because there was always something to cross of my list. Those closest to me received attention but I could have done more to get to know more people on a deeper level. My boss would encourage me, "Maria, get out into the field." I didn't do it as often as I could have. I now recognize how valuable and meaningful it is to really get to know people, I missed out for many years. Now it's something I do much more intentionally.

BEST ADVICE YOU'VE BEEN GIVEN?

Know Youself to Lead Yourself. The development of self-awareness is one of the most important things anyone will do over a lifetime. Understanding my own personal tendencies and the experience people are having on the other side of me has been eye-opening. I didn't spend enough time reflecting on my interactions when I was younger. I dismissed tense interactions as inconsequential when there's probably something I could have done differently. I am much more intentional about my actions because they have an impact on everyone around me whether it be a family member or a client. I want it to be a good experience to interact with me.

HOW DO YOU BEST MANAGE YOUR TIME?

I've learned that the key to managing my time is managing my energy. I am the most productive and engaged between 6AM - 12 noon. I try to do my planning, strategizing and reflective thinking during this time. If I misuse this time doing trivial or administrative tasks, I squander my best energy. After I've devoted time to my most important priorities, I am than free to be more relational and engaged with those around me without distraction. I've also learned that if I don't incorporate regular recharge time I become less productive.

WHEN YOU STARTED YOUR JOB OR GOT INTO THE CONSTRUCTION INDUSTRY WHAT DO YOU WISH YOU WOULD HAVE KNOWN?

I wish I would have known how much fun my job would have been! I really enjoy my job, not so much of the political side, but inspections and learning new things about how buildings are built. The technology of HVAC and plumbing changes all the time.

BEST ADVICE YOU'VE BEEN GIVEN?

The best advice I have been given is that if I am going to be doing inspections on mechanical and plumbing systems, I better know how they work first.

HOW DO YOU BEST MANAGE YOUR TIME?

My time is sometimes difficult to manage as a chief inspector. We have several administrative duties that need to be completed throughout the month, as well as doing inspections within a timely manner. I am lucky because most of the contractors I deal with know that I have a lot going on and we work together to get the jobs done. I usually take two to three days out of the month and just focus on administrative items and plan review, but the rest of my time is spent doing inspections.

THE BIGGEST LESSON YOU LEARNED THE HARD WAY?

Patience. If an answer can be researched and then responded to or if I didn't have the answer right away, "BUT I know where to get the answer", then approach as such.

Never answer a question out of pressure to do so because you commit to it.

WHEN YOU STARTED YOUR JOB OR GOT INTO THE CONSTRUCTION INDUSTRY WHAT DO YOU WISH YOU WOULD HAVE KNOWN?

I started out a laborer and if I knew there was more to construction than just swinging a hammer......I may have pursued much more, sooner.

BEST ADVICE YOU'VE BEEN GIVEN?

Go into each business situation just like you would your day.....with a cool head and a warm heart.

HOW DO YOU BEST MANAGE YOUR TIME?

I best manage my time with the balance of exercise and gained knowledge. I make time for the gym and also to assess what I have learned from the project, or day. How can I refine my process? How can I pass on what I've learned? And what can I delegate out to bring more value to my employees as an owner? Everything else just falls in place but it has to stem from a personal choice.
